What is wonderful about planet Earth?

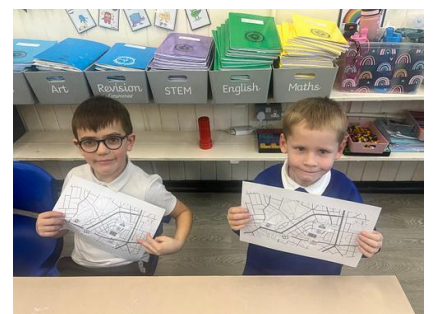


In Year 1 the children have learnt all of the countries and capital cities of the UK. They have developed their map skills looking at aerial images, learnt about London landmarks and drawn comparisons with Brasillia.
